EDITORIAL.

It is satisfactory to find that the Cobham Parish Council have taken immediate action in opposition to the proposal of the Corporation of Rochester to absorb the Parish of Cobham into that area, and that other local authorities are following this example.

By an almost unforgivable oversight the name of the Chairman, Mr. W. Pve, was omitted from the list of members of the Parish Council given in our January issue. Mr. W. Pve has devoted over half a century to local government work having given service during that period as a Guardian and District and Parish Councillor.

Readers who may be retaining the list should add Mr. W. Pye's name and also substitute the name of Mr. L. K. Pve for that of Mr. T. Rouse, who has left the village.

The Editor has received one communication only in response to last month's suggestion as to War Stories, which will be published in the issue for March. He hopes that further items will be forthcoming, as our British Legion members, and maybe others, must have had experiences worth recording and preserving.

C.A.D.S. POSTPONEMENT.

At a General Meeting on Jan. 24th, the Society decided to increase the subscription to 3/6 (minimum). As a rent of £12 is to be paid annually to the Hut Management Committee, it is hoped that more members (acting and non-acting) will join us.

THE PARISH COUNCIL.

A meeting was held in the schools on January 8th, when Mr. Wm. Pye was in the Chair. There were present Messrs, W. Broad, A. Davidson, G. Horton, T. Hoppe and H. T. Gates (Clerk).

The letter from the Strood Rural District Council (from which we published a few extracts last month.—Ed.) was very fully discussed, with the result that a communication which had been prepared by the Clerk. was unanimously approved, and sent to the authorities concerned, stating how very disadvantageous it would be for Cobham to be included in the Urban District of Rochester.

The Council also went into the matter of the Recreation Ground. A letter had been received from the Management Committee of the Village Club, offering to sub-let the portion situated between the Schools and the "Ship Inn" to the Council until 1983, when their own lease with the Earl of Darnley expires. It was thought advisable to find out the exact conditions that would be asked, and to then meet representatives, with whom the subject could be discussed, as it would appear to be a great benefit to the Parish, especially to mothers and children.

The deplorable state of the Village Green (?) was then brought forward by the Chairman. and opinion was unanimous that it would be preferable for this, the green, to be abolished altogether.

Mr. L. K. Pve was then elected to fill the vacancy on the Council, caused by the absence of Mr. T. Rouse. It was thought that the District Council representative should be a member of this body.

Since the above meeting was held, it has been definitely decided to do away with the little green opposite the War Memorial; also the Village Club representatives have arranged to meet the Council on Feb. 5th, to discuss the recreation ground.

We hope we may be excused for reiterating here some of the more important reasons relating to the proposed absorbtion of this Parish by Rochester, as we feel that everybody should be fully alive to the dangers of such a move. In fact, we should be neglecting our duty to the Parishioners if we failed to do so. We had expected to receive a host of letters on the subject, but nobody has thought fit to express an opinion through the medium of this Village publication, which is run entirely in the interests of Cobham as a whole.

First and foremost, compare the rates. Strood Rural area stand at 9/3 as against about 16/3 for Rochester. Doesn't that alone speak for itself? There are many causes for this difference, chief among them being the fact that the Rural Housing schemes do not cost the ratepayers any money; the water supplies, sanitary arrangements where undertaken by the Council, the Hospital for infections diseases, the management of the roads, etc., are all economically run, without the maintainance of unnecessary offices and separate departments. What would happen to the educational arrangements? hesitate to say much on this subject at the moment beyond the fact that we are well satisfied at present. Then again, how can anybody compare the conditions of Town and Country life? They are absolutely different, and any proposal to amalgamate the two for the purposes of local administration, for the benefit of the latter would be, well, ludicious. It would certainly be most distasteful and contrary to the wishes of this Parish.

COBHAM LAWN TENNIS CLUB.

On Thursday, Jan. 23rd, a meeting of the members of the Club was held at the Village Hall, Mr. J. F. Brady presiding. It was decided to carry on during the coming season under the conditions suggested by the new Management Committee. As it will be necessary to raise an increased income a special effort is to be made to ensure the success of our Whist Drive and Dance, on St. Patrick's Day, Monday, March 17th. COBHAM BOWLING CLUB.

That the Club should be reformed and carry on under the new regime, twelve members guaranteeing up to the sum of one pound each should we find ourselves in debt at the end of the first season. The subscriptions should be as in previous seasons, viz.: 6/- per member, or £I is. per Vice-President, the latter to include Green Fees except during matches.

The Green Fees will be on the same scale as in previous seasons, except that during away matches 6d. will be charged to all playing members and that in home matches an inclusive fee of 2/6 will be charged for refresh-

ments and green fees.
